American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) News

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, abbreviated ARRA, is an economic stimulus package enacted by the 111th United States Congress in February 2009. The Act was based largely on proposals made by President Barack Obama and was intended to provide a stimulus to the U.S. economy in the wake of the economic downturn. The measures are nominally worth \$787 billion. Besides federal tax cuts, expansion of unemployment benefits and other social welfare provisions, the Act includes domestic spending in education, health care, and infrastructure, including the energy sector.

Recovery Act and Grants.gov - A new feature was unveiled on Grants.gov to help users find and apply for ARRA grant opportunities. The launch of the ARRA or Recovery Act feature on the homepage of Grants.gov will direct users to Recovery Act opportunities, other Recovery Act resources, upcoming Webinars and links to www.whitehouse.gov/recovery and www.recovery.gov.

Federal Grants

NEW - Connecting to Collections Statewide Grants. *Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS)* announces funds to support statewide, collaborative planning grants to address the recommendations of the Heritage Health Index (HHI), which found the collections held in the public trust by libraries, museums, and archives to be at great risk. These planning grants are intended to engage institutions with responsibility for collections stewardship within a state in consultation and planning for ways to address the HHI recommendations most relevant for their state.

Eligibility: State governments and nonprofit organizations.

Deadline: December 15, 2009

Funds: Awards range up to \$250,000.

Scholarly Editions and Translations

National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) announces funds to support the preparation of editions and translations of pre-existing texts and documents that are currently inaccessible or available in inadequate editions. Projects must be undertaken by a team of at least one editor or translator and one other staff member. Grants typically support editions and translations of significant literary, philosophical, and historical materials, but other types of work, such as musical notation, are also eligible.

Eligibility: City or township governments, county governments, public and state controlled

institutions of higher education, state governments, nonprofit organizations, private institutions of higher education and community-based organizations.

Deadline: October 29, 2009.

Funds: Awards range from \$50,000-\$100,000.

Community Capacity Development Office (CCDO) FY10 Weed and Seed Communities Competitive Program Guide

Department of Justice announces funds to support "the Weed and Seed strategy," which aims to prevent, control, and reduce violent crime, criminal drug-related activity, and gang activity. The Weed and Seed strategy is a community-based, comprehensive multi-agency approach. Four elements make up the two-pronged Weed and Seed Strategy: Law Enforcement; Community Policing; Prevention, Intervention, and Treatment; and Neighborhood Restoration. Weed and Seed Communities must work to reduce crime and improve the quality of life for residents in a community primarily through the redeployment of existing public and private resources, addressing both crime and social related problems that without proper intervention often lead to violent crime, drug abuse, and gang activity.

Eligibility: City or township governments, county governments, state governments, nonprofit organizations, faith-based organizations, community-based organizations and DC government agencies.

Deadline: December 1, 2009.

Funds: Awards range up to \$150,000. A match is required.

2010 Program and Field Grants

US Soccer Foundation announces funds to support funding, equipment, and services for soccer programs across the United States. With the exception of Synthetic Field Building projects, grants will be awarded exclusively to projects and programs that develop players, coaches, and referees in economically disadvantaged urban areas encompassing populations of 50,000 or more. The Foundation is especially interested in those organizations that meet the above focus and incorporate a youth development element such as anti-violence, anti-drugs, healthy lifestyles, etc., into their soccer programs.

Eligibility: Nonprofit organizations.

Deadline: October 30, 2009.

Funds: Awards range up to \$100,000.

990 Online Resource

In collaboration with the National Association of Attorney's General/National Association of State Charity Officials (NAAG/NASCO) and GuideStar, the National Center for Charitable Statistics NCCS has developed an online system, the 990 Online, for charities to complete all their federal Form 990 and state registration filing requirements and file these forms electronically. E-Filing of IRS Form 990s and state charity forms benefits nonprofit organizations, regulators, researchers, and donors alike. This online service offers an easy-to-use web-based system for completing IRS Form 990s, 990s-EZ or 8868 (application for extension). The system is free for organizations with less than \$100,000 in gross receipts and there is a sliding scale for larger organizations. William and Flora Hewlett Foundation released an online report based on interviews conducted with dozens of practitioners and thought leaders in the social sector. The report describes twenty different shared measurement systems already in use and documents their contribution to increasing grantees' efficiency, knowledge, and impact. The findings identify shared approaches to performance, outcome, or impact measurement across multiple organizations. The report includes four in-depth case studies where collaborative learning and measurement systems are used to create systemic and adaptive approaches to solving social problems. Tips to Get the Grant Funding You Need

Don't cut your proposal off at the knees. Since proposals submitted vastly outnumber grants that can be made, grant reviewers are usually pressed for time. Try to avoid pushing their "pet peeve buttons." Here are the top ten ways to frustrate a grant reviewer and irritants most likely to send your proposal straight to the reject pile:

- Your proposal is in 8-point type; it has ½-inch margins; it's in a plastic cover that clamps shut; and you sent fewer copies than requested.
- You included unrelated attachments and/or failed to send requested attachments.
- The budget you submitted has a different total from the one in the proposal, or it doesn't balance, or it includes expenses that aren't eligible for funding.
- You used lots of jargon, abbreviations, and incomprehensible acronyms.
- The proposal is the same one you sent to several other grantmakers.
- The amount you requested doesn't match the funding available.
- You didn't follow instructions or answer questions.
- You don't respond to the funder's telephone calls or emails.
